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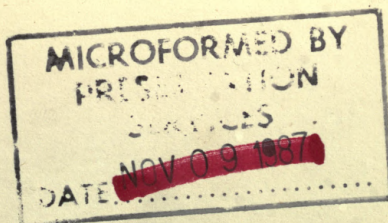
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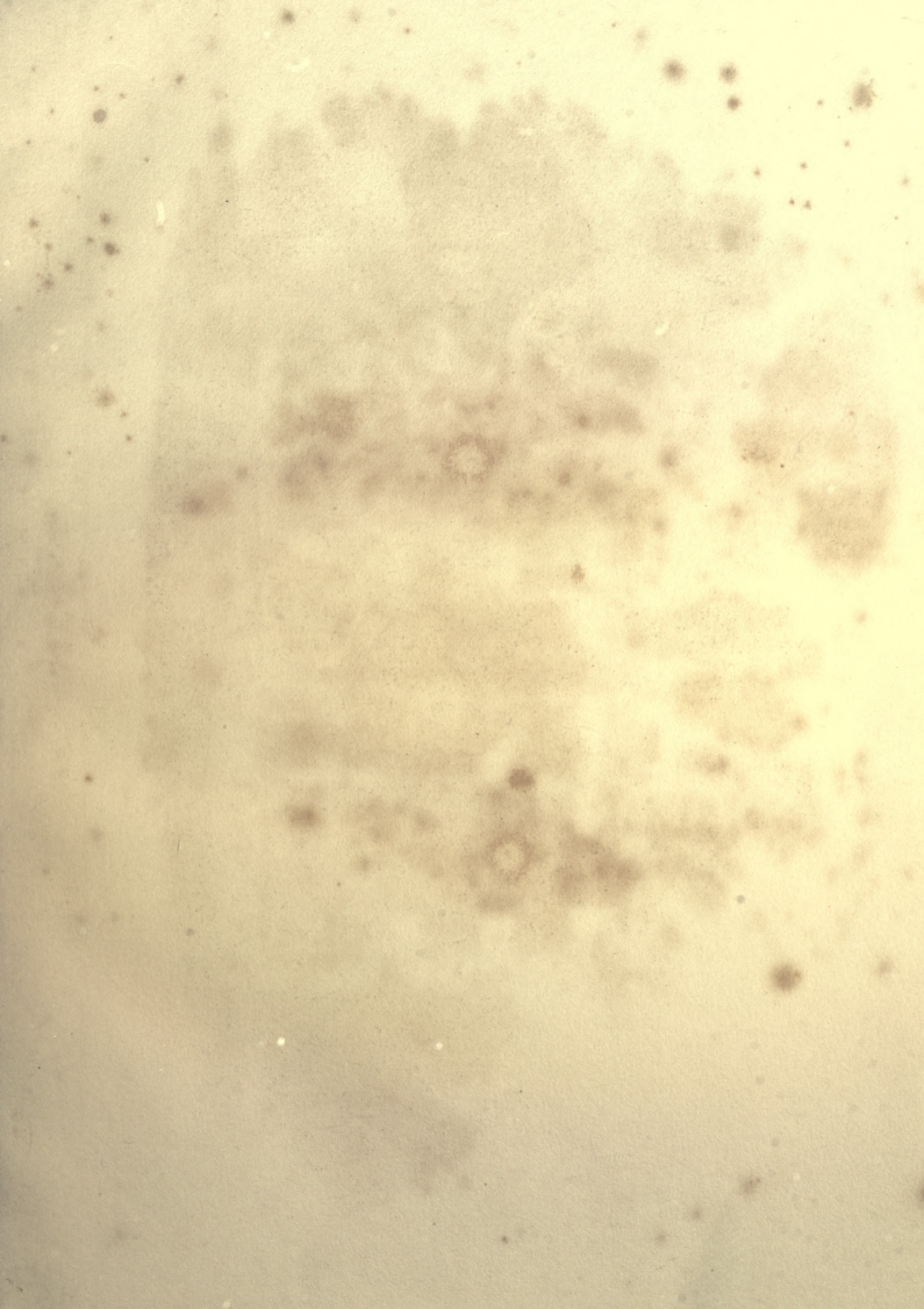

[Februarie, 1583.] Halffe a messe of herynge v^s viij^d. Thrie salte fysshes iij^s iiij^d. Mvskeles and kokeles [mussels and cockles] ix^d. Towe lovde of coles iij^d. Sherpeinge the harrove pennes ij^d. A pound of soppe [soap] iiij^d. Barly bought for side [seed] at Tyngreve and Hovle the xxth daye of Fabruary, fortye mettes, and to be delyvered at Maye daye or there abouttes the price iiij^{li} xiiij^s iiij^d. Mendinge the plowe ierenes and showinge the worke horsies at Tyngreve iij^s. Wyllyam Kenyon the xxiiijth daye of Fabruary at his goinge upe to Londone for eis ovne chargies and Expofer Smithe and the geldinges xl^s. A gald for Blackrode barne vjd. Margarete Asheton for a quarter wyege iij^s.

[Marche, 1583.] A messe of heringe xij^s ij^d. Spente by Ellies Howlden in fecchinge of them vij^d. For a [plough] share xv^d. The parrishe clarke of the Deane churche for his öttes [oats] w^{ch} he vsethe to gether iiij^d. For a mandatōn vnto the shrevffe for Wylliam Stones ij^s iiij^d. Foure mettes of mvskelles and kocckes fecched at towe sundry tymes in lente xxiiij^d. For leyinge of a wape [? wapentake] vnto Wyllyam Duckworthē of Tyngreve viij^d. The charregde of certen stouffe w^{ch} my m^{ris} sente downe ix^d. Foure hundrethe oxen showe nalle, and thrie plowe cloutes v^s. For wyeving of canves the xxiiijth daye of Marche ij^s x^d. Robert Varley and his mene for makynge whiels and brekyng of tymber xxij^s. For fisshe at Prestone aganste my brothers comynge to the Smitheles the xxiiijth of Marche as foloveth: a salte samonde and a fresse samonde, a salte fishe and towe salte ielles [? eels] ij^s. Rede herynges and a hundrethe of sprotes [sprats] xij^d; mvskelles and kocckes xiiij^d. Spente in fecchinge

them iiij^d. A querte of vinycare iiij^d. Safrone vj^d. Pasmete sides [? parsnip seeds] j^d ob. At Boulton the xxvijth of Marche for seven p'sonnes w^{ch} wyere at my brotheres tablye iij^s vj^d. Fore eleven servinge mene iij^s viij^d. A quarte of wyne vj^d. For extreordinary drinke ij^s iiij^d. Horce mete ij^s vj^d. A pound of figdes [figs] iiij^d.

All the said sommes of money disbursed by my brother Thomas sithence the ixth of September 1582, in the xxiiijth yeare of the reigne of oure Sovereigne Lady Elyzabethe are vnto hym payde and allowed by his brother Rychard Shuttleworth the xxvijth daye of Marche 1583, beinge in the xxvth yeare of the reigne of the said quene, and there ys remayninge as yett in his handes of money delyvered to him the somme of viij^l xvijs ij^d. (Signed) Thomas Shuttleworth.—Delyvered vnto my brother Thomas Shuttleworth the fyfte of Apryll in the xxvth yeare of the reigne of oure Souereigne Ladye Elyzabethe the some of one hundrethe poundes ouer and besydes the saide somme of viij^l xvijs ij^d. [Signed, not R^d but] Thomas Shuttleworth.

For the houslynge [Sacrament] of seven p'sonnes and spent at the same time x^d. Payed a fyftynte and a halffe w^{ch} goethe towerdes the mentenance of the prysoneres and the rogges at Manchester xj^d: this gald was at the Tyngreffe. For dychinge a dike be tyxte Mr. Flytewod [Fleetwood] and your ovne lande at Tyngreffe iij^s x^d. For the tablynge of John Hansone at Tyngreve from As Weddensdaye vnto Ester ieve xj^s ij^d. For odd mete and drynke for diveres persones w^{ch} came [on] busines vnto the Tyngreve xviij^d. Four stone of butter xij^s. For the mendinge the horce shewes viij^d. The tablynge of Wylliam Ducworth sexe wyekes x^s. Mr. Mvlynexe for his rente w^{ch} is dwe at Wytsondaye v^s. To remember that

Wylllyam Ducworthe begane his yere tablynge the xxvijth daye of January wth Hughe Tomsonsone, and mvste paye for the same iiij^{li} xiii^s iiij^d [5½ marks]. Thomas Leuer liiiij^s x^d towards the pamente of the bussshopes rente and for the makinge of the buttres at Boul-tone. Nicholas Starkye for a bulle in biry [Bury] xxxix^s. Towe oxen iiij^{li} xxj^d. Towe oxen v^l viij^s viij^d. Towe horsies in haye ij^d. Mr. Morlaye for the tyethe of the demane of Howle xx^s. Thrie hundrethe and thretye pounce of ierone for the shouinge of towre pare of wheles xlvj^s ij^d. Boughte xxxijth hoggesse [hogs] v^l xvj^s. Boughte xiiijth hogges xlix^s ij^d.

[Maye, 1583.] Boughte in Blackbourne the furste daye of Maye of Roberte wyffe Whalaye one cowe xxvj^s x^d; towre tynteres xlvj^s; towre oxen iiij^l xvj^d; one cowe xxvj^s; in Burnlay towre tynteres xlvij^s j^d; in Coulen [Colne] towre tynteres xxx^s vj^d; a cowe xxviij^s vj^d. In Ingleforthe fare, one cowe xxxij^s vj^d [and various other cattle]. Bestes boughte in Wygane: one heffer sterke xv^s x^d; a bull styrke xxxviij^s viij^d. Tene gallandes of tere [? tar] xj^s ij^d. Four chore [score] and fifte hogges [hogs] xv^l xv^s vj^d. Spente in dryvinge the same viij^d. Sixe mettes of barlye to be souned at Lastoke xij^s; four pound of hoppes xxiij^d. In Sanforthe, towre oxen iiij^{li} xviij^s iiij^d. A quarter of velle xij^d. Rychard the smithe, for towre dayes workynge xij^d. Bryan Lever for brui'ge [brewing] xij^d. A littell boye of Seth Man's for hilpinge to get toures [turves] in, iiij^d. Elyes Harper for wyedinge in the gardene viij^d. For towre broste [? brace or breast] wyemblye [? wimble, a piercer, to bore holes with,] bittes and a nale percell bitte [nail-piercer, i.e. gimlet] ij^d.

[June, 1583.] A rente w^{ch} goeth oute of Croftlyffe akeres, w^{ch} was dwe at Crestemmes laste paste vnto my lorde of Darbe xx^d. Vnto a lybber of piges xij^d. John Langworthe for gettynge tourffes in, sixe dayes ix^d. Thachinge tynty dayes at Smitheles and Lastoke vij^s x^d. The wyffe of James Simpson for going betyxte Tyn-greve and Smitheles vj^d. Spente in fecchinge barlye frome Hoole v^d. Jennete Longworthe, for wyeddinge [weeding] in the gardenes vj^d. For shoving towre pare of wheles vij^s. For kyllynge

a kowe iiij^d. A quarter of mvttone xiiij^d. A potte of alle vij^d. Towe penneworthe of whette serede [? white cerate] ij^d. Towe sithesse [scythes] iiij^s viij^d. For sherynge of towe aker of ottes in Longelandes vij^s vj^d.

[July, 1583.] Foure ponde of hoppes xxij^d. Halffe a hundrethe of horce showe nale ij^s vj^d. For mendinge of a saddell vj^d. A framyng save [? sieve] ij^s. A whiele wrighte, for ringginge a pare of whilles and axellinge towe wyenes [wains] xviiij^d. For towe ponde of peper that wente to the Lyme when the stagges were sente to Londone v^s iiij^d. The kiper at Lyme for killinge towe stagges iiij^s. The kowke [cook] at Lyme iiij^s. To Expofor Smithe when he wente wthe the keper a boutte the kyllinge of the said stagges ij^s. Wyendoinge tyntie sieoffes of ottes at Tyngreve xx^d. Mesurainge tyntyng aker of land at Houle viij^d. Towe poundes of peper and a halffe vij^s j^d. Fisshe at Boulton fare xvij^d. For kyllinge of an oxe vj^d. A pare of picfforke granes [prongs] at Lastoke iiij^d. Sithe sande j^d. Rychard the smithe for a daye worke iiij^d. John Hindlay, for lettynge all the besse [beasts] blude both at Smithes and Lastoke v^s. The keperes of Mr. Townleyes w^{ch} did bryng a stage to the Smithes v^s. A keper w^{ch} did kille a stage in Bolland iiij^s. Carrigdes of a pakete of Mr. James Lyghe w^{ch} came frome London vj^s.

[Auguste, 1583.] The kyper of Houghtone pke iiij^s. Gieles Warde the constablie of Hallywell, for a gald a boutte a sute at Rivingtone viij^d. Tho^s Longworth, for thrie dayes worke at haye iiij^d. The constablie of Littell Boulton, thrie fiftentes for a yald w^{ch} is laide a boutte a suite a gainste Rivingtone vj^d. A bucher for kyllinge of a cowe iiij^d. The clarke of the Dene churche the rente of Auguste for his wyeges xij^d. [To several men each] for workinge sixe dayes at haye vj^d. Carregd of a letter frome Mr. Thomas Heskethe vj^d. The smythe for workinge towe dayes xij^d. For a day movinge vj^d. Towe dowssone of axeltrie cloutes and nales for the same ij^s viij^d. For the dressinge of the gardenes and kepinge of the same (all sevenge wiedding) from the thride daye of Maye unto Mychelmes,— nine shillynges. Makynge houkes and sikeles

and for stiele to the same ijs iiij^d. A pare of tracies x^d. Towe hundrethe of slate iij^s x^d.

[September, 1583.] Payed unto Wyllyam Wode to the jusse [use] of Sr Gilberte Garrete [Gerard] for the tiethe of Hiltone and Heitone viij^s viij^d. For ix mettes of whette w^{ch} was souned at Houle lv^s vj^d. Spente by Wyllyam Ducworthe when he wente to sell benes at Preston, thrie dayes x^d. The smithe at Houle for mendinge the ploue ierenes v^d. For oñe to driffe the ploue for oune daye att Tyngreve iij^d. For movinge of foure akers of haye at Tyngreve vj^s. Tentyng of eighte akers of haye at Tyngreve xij^s. For a boye to driffe the harrove foure dayes xij^d. For settinge on a showe at Boultone iij^d. Spente by Roberte Aspeden in the getheringe of the tiethe of Hiltone ijs vj^d. Mendinge of the barne of Blackrode viij^d. A hundrethe of ierene viij^s viij^d. For the tyethe corne in Houle vnto Mr. Morley xx^s. For leyedinge the corne in Houle viij^s. Mr. Stopforthe for the tyethe corne silver of Tynggreffe xij^s iij^d. Oune hundrethe of ierone and thrie pounds xiiij^s iij^d.

[October, 1583.] Spente in Boultone upone the beste fare vj^d. Roberte Aspeden, w^{ch} he spent when he was in getheringe the tiethe of Hicton iiij^s ij^d. A quarter of myttone xvij^d. From this point the handwriting is a different one, the spelling better, and the whole mode of keeping the accounts more clerkly. The explanation, we believe, will be found in the decease of Thomas Shuttleworth, the youngest brother, who had hitherto acted as his eldest brother's agent and steward; his place being filled, or at least his duties discharged for a short time, by the second brother, the Rev. Lawrence Shuttleworth, Rector of Witchford, Warwickshire. Here, then, is the fitting place to introduce a copy of a document, written on two leaves of foolscap, pinned together, but which was found loose within the leaves of this volume. It is endorsed —

Referring the reader to the brief account of Mr. Thomas Shuttleworth to be found in the Introduction to this volume, we return to the book of House and Farm Accounts, as continued by his successor and brother, Lawrence Shuttleworth, and by others.

This book is not nearly so bulky as Vol. II. The payments occupy pp. 1—116, and the receipts the remainder of the volume, pp. 117—196. The extracts from it are limited to such a selection of entries as seem to throw light on prices, customs, or manners. Items recurring year after year are not repeated, lest their iteration should weary the reader. The total cessation of such items in the accounts must not be inferred from their omission here.

[This is the last entry in this volume, p. 196, and, so far as we can see, the last entry of accounts kept at Smithells. After the death of Sir Richard, Mr. Lawrence Shuttleworth, who succeeded to his brother's estates, seems to have immediately commenced the building of the new house of Gawthorpe Hall; and thenceforward the accounts of the chief steward seem to have been kept there.]

VOLUME IV.

From 1st FEBRUARY, 1599-1600, to 30th JUNE, 1601.

This is a long, thin, and narrow book, of coarse laid paper, with a hard parchment cover, containing, in 88 pages, the accounts of seventeen months. These accounts relate chiefly to the purchase of building materials, the wages of labour in getting and preparing them for use, and the wages and maintenance of the workmen in various building trades, and of their labourers, in the erection of the present edifice of Gawthorpe Hall; the first stone of which was laid (as an entry p. 23 in this volume, and another on its last page inform us) on the 26th August, 1600. There is consequently less variety in the nature of the items of expenditure than in the three former volumes. They may be ranged under a few heads; as, the mason, for getting or hewing stone in the delph, then squaring it, or rough-dressing it with the hammer, called "scappling;" and an extra charge is made for the stone prepared for the window frames, &c., of the hall; the waller also gets an inferior stone in the quarry and prepares it, and builds the walls; the wright goes to Mytton wood, or Read wood, fells the timber, squares it for beams, or saws it up for boards; and then carters, with their wains, bring both stone and timber to Gawthorpe; lime for the mortar, and also for manuring the ground around the hall, is brought from Clithero; iron, rod, bar, and other, from Halifax, and smiths are employed by the year at quarterly wages to work it up at Gawthorpe; wheelwrights are also extensively employed in

repairing the carts, and saddlers in replacing harness and other gear. In short, the volume shows the mode in which the erection of a considerable mansion was conducted at the close of the sixteenth and beginning of the seventeenth century. Such items are selected as will show prices and rates of wages for skilled and unskilled labour, and whatever else may tend to throw a light on the customs and manners of the period. The volume commences with the following heading:—

Primo Maij, 1601. I have rec. of Ric. Wilkinson, xl^s. [On the last page in the volume, in a more modern hand, is written — "26 August 1600. The first stone of y^e new Hall att Gawthrop was laide."]

[This book, like volume IV, is chiefly filled with disbursements on account of the building of Gawthorpe Hall; and our selected entries become consequently fewer. This is a long, narrow book, like a petty cashbook, made by stitching coarse laid paper into a parchment cover. During the two years over which its entries extend, Edward Sherborne continued to be the steward of the Rev. Lawrence Shuttleworth; and sometimes the entries were made by the principal, though for the most part by his agent. The heading to the volume, on its first page, is as follows:—]

JULY 1, 1605, TO JUNE 30, 1606.

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This is a very similar volume to the last, containing the receipts and disbursements of one year in 92 pages. Most of the payments relate to the building, fitting, and furnishing of the new hall of Gawthorpe; and the difficulty in selection is to avoid iteration. A portion of the top of every leaf has been discoloured by damp or some liquid, and the writing there is quite effaced. Pages 1 and 2 contain various memoranda, amongst others the following:—

9^o Au'ste, 1605. A note of suche [? lands] in Paydyam belonging [to my Mr Laur: Shuttleworth Esq. of] Gawthorpe. Imp^mis xx oxganges at Heigh Whitteker whereof one and a halfe the tenentes Northwood hath in occupaytion. It'm, half an oxgange at Copthurste. Towe oxganges, layt Lister landes. One oxgange and a halfe, layt Banister landes, whereof Hugh Roe and John Roe hath one oxgang betixte them in occupaytion. Tow oxganges, layt Willasall landes. Tow oxganges, layt Hadocke's landes. One oxgange, layt Cockeshot landes. Halfe an oxgange, layt Robinson landes. Fyve acar in Dubkar, layt of Marshalls oxgange. All which said oxganges were galded and payd the day and year above said towardses the bildinge of the scollhowse and the new smethe at the weste end of Padyam, and layd or galded at x^s the oxgange.

M'd: — That the xixth of June 1607 I receivid from Moch Houll in syling tymber three hundrith fyve score and seven pvnchiones [punchion, a joist, or upright piece of stout timber in a wooden partition] and fyve hundreth three score and nyne panell bordes, that came furth of Ireland, and bought of Richard Stonnes, viz. ix hundreth lvj pices in all. Item the vijth of Auguste 1607, more received of the said tymber, viz. lxxj paynell bordes, and in montence [montenance, amount] viij score and xix. Soe all the said tymber is come from Holle.

[At page 13 is "a note of all the oxe hyed and cow hyed that were delivered to the tanner to be tanned in 1605." The first is the hide of "one branded oxe, killed, that was bought in winter." Page 15 is a list of the "Ottemeall mayd in the year 1605." Some is kiln-dried for malt; some is ground into meal; and of the rest is made "cut grottes," i.e. oats hulled or coarsely ground. Next is the "Barly mayd into malte at Gawthorpe in the year 1605." The quantity from the 20th January to the 7th June was "vj scor mettes," or 120 bushels, if met has here the ordinary signification; but it seems to have sometimes been used in these accounts as equivalent to two pecks only, or half a bushel, and in that case this half year's supply of barley malt would be 60 bushels.]

JULY 1, 1608, TO NOVEMBER 6, 1613.

Volume VII. of these accounts closes June 30, 1606; and it is therefore clear that Volume VIII., containing the two years between that date and the commencement of the present volume, is wanting. The present volume, which contains 202 pages, has had a few leaves cut out at the beginning, and the upper portion of some at the end torn out. From damp, or the action of some liquid, the upper portion of most of the pages is discoloured, the texture of the paper destroyed, and from ten to twenty lines, or more, utterly obliterated. In the interval since June, 1606, the Rev. Laurence Shuttleworth had died, and had been succeeded by his nephew Richard, the eldest son of his brother Thomas. Richard Shuttleworth was married, and this volume opens with house expenditure of the family in London.

Money received [by Anthony Wilkinson] of James Yate at sundry tymes, as followeth:—[Inter alia] Nov. 27, 1608, Received, which is disbursed for the gentlewomen, as maye appeare by their bookes, xxvij^{li}; summa totalis of Antonie Wilkinsons receipts, is, I say 386^l 2^s 11^d.—All which sayd summes I have seene discharged and made straight betweene myselfe and Antonie Wilkinson, to weet [to wit] from the 15th of November 1608 till this present seavent of December 1609. In wittnes whereof we have put to our names. In the p'sence of Nic: Shuttleworthe, by mee [signed] Ric: Shuttleworthe, Anthony Wilkinsonn. In the p'sence of mee [signed] Nic: Shuttleworth.

[With these memoranda this volume of accounts closes, page 202. The next volume in order is lost, so that there is a hiatus of three years in the accounts, from November 1613, to November 1616. We pass therefore from vol. IX to vol. XI.]

STEWARDS' ACCOUNTS.

VOLUME XI.

NOVEMBER 5, 1616, TO OCTOBER 30, 1621.

This last volume of these old accounts is a long, narrow book of 164 pages, the parchment cover of which has become detached and lost. In the lapse of three years since the last entry in vol. IX, there seems to have been no change in principal or agent. "Ric: Shuttleworthe" still audits, allows, and signs the accounts of his steward "James Yate." Before proceeding to the ordinary entries of household expenditure, travelling expenses, and farm accounts, we must copy two long lists of the spices bought in London, one on the occasion of the lady's confinement, the other the usual proportion of spices bought in London at Michaelmas. We shall place them in juxtaposition: —

In this volume commences a weekly account of the consumption of provisions, &c., not bought, but the produce of the farm, the poultry yard, the dairy, and the brewery, and which are termed “ex proprio,” or “of one’s own.” At the end of each month we shall bring four or five of these weekly accounts together; as showing the average weekly consumption of the household. They are usually classed under the heads of kitchen, *deyrie*, and *butterie*; and occasionally a fourth head shows the consumption of provender, &c., in the stable. The four weekly accounts, then, in the month of November, 1616, stand thus:—

1st week. — *Besydes ex proprio*. — Spent [expended, used] in the *kitchen*: One mutton, twoe pigges, foure chickens, lxiiij egges, one skate fishe, and a pecke of flower. Spent in the *deyrie*: Tenn kyne milke [the milk of ten cows], one stone et di: of butter, and twoe cheeses. Spent in the *butterie*: In w^{te} bread aighen: [eacandoles, or lumps]; in jannocks [oatenbread, in large coarse loaves] four mettes. In smale beare 3 hodgsheds; in strong beare one barrell; in candles iiij^{li}. Spent in the *stable*: [Nil.]

2nd week. — *Kitchen*: Half a veale, one mutton, vij chickens, lxxv egges, one skate fishe, and a pecke of flower. *Deyrie*: x kyne milke, one stone et quartran of butter, and one cheese. *Butterie*: W^{te} bread three aighen: jannocks, iiij metts; [the rest as in 1st week.]

3rd week. — *Kitchen*: [Same as 2nd week, save a chicken, an egg, and a skate fish less this week.] *Deyrie*: [Same as 2nd week, except] ij stone of butter and three stone of butter for the shepherd. *Butterie*: [As 2nd week, except no strong beer and] smale beare 4 hodgsheds. *Stable*: In about viij weeks, in oates lv metts.

4th week. — *Kitchen*: One mutton, one q’re of veale, v chickens, 68 egges, and a pecke of flower. *Deyrie*: x kyne milk, one stone of butter, and one cheese. *Butterie*: In w^{te} bread a pecke; jannocks iiij metts; smale beare four hogsheds; strong beare one barrell, and iiij^l of candles.

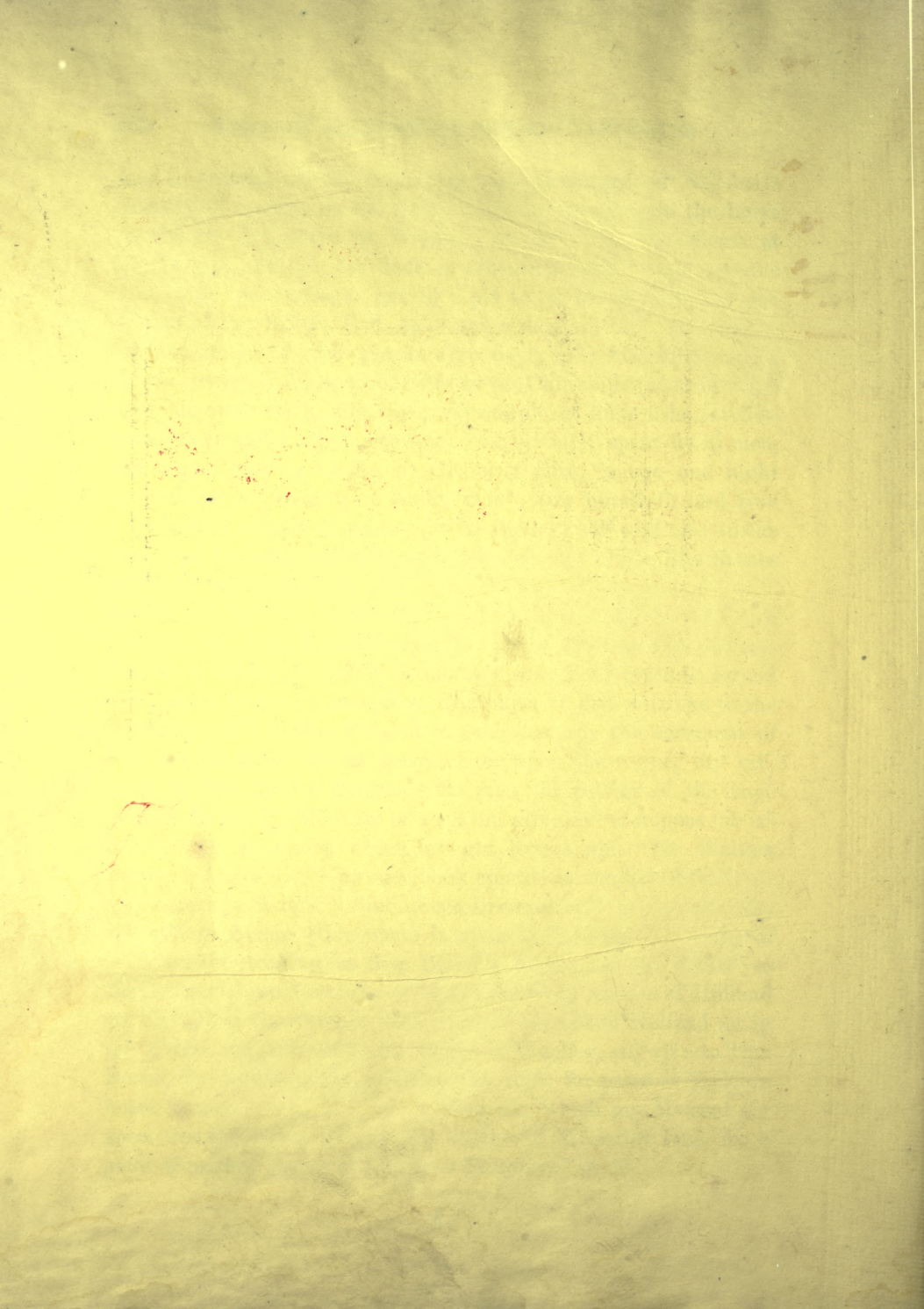
