

I wish to thank all those of you who have co-operated by completing the questionnaire in connection with the congregational census. We have had 310 returns so far, and when these have been fed through the computer they should give us an accurate profile of our church membership. I'm not quite sure what the computer will make of a bogus return from a 14 year old Pathfinder who claimed to be the parent of 6 children! I'm glad to say that the overwhelming majority of people appear to have answered the questions responsibly. The response to the supplementary form in which you were invited to indicate areas where you could help or church organisations you wished to join has been less encouraging. It is not too late to return these yellow sheets.

Our Mission Support Group is putting its mind to ways and means of extending an interest in, and prayerful and practical support for, the overseas missions and home charities to which we give donations through our Christian Giving Programme. One of their suggestions is to be put into operation this month. It involves putting the spotlight on a mission or charity by allocating a whole page of this monthly newsletter to it. And then in the Parish Prayer Diary each week one prayer topic relating to that mission will be included in the hope that those who use it daily, and those who conduct the Intercessions in church on Sundays, will pray for these matters. We are starting with Tear Fund which last year was the largest recipient of our giving.

The Ladies Guild and Mothers Union both appointed new leadership teams during the past month. Trene Ashley assisted by Carol Tickle take over the leadership of the Ladies Guild, whilst Janetta Makin, Ann Preston and Marjorie Stokes will share the leadership of the lothers Union. I welcome this development because I am firmly committed to the principle of shared and changing leadership. As a congregation we shall have an opportunity of acknowledging their leadership in a short act of commissioning during the Family Communion service on February 5th.

For many years the proceeds of our Lent Appeal have been given to the work of the Church Missionary Society (C.M.S.) overseas. This year our Church Council have asked that people be given the opportunity of supporting either the Church Urban Fund (C.U.F.) and/or the C.D.S. The C.U.F. has been established to provide grant aid to Christian projects in areas of urban deprivation, and as a parish we are seeking to give about £5,000 spread over the next 4 years to this fund. (Incidentally, Oliver Forshaw from the Wythenshawe Estate will be telling us at the Saturday Night at Eight on February 4th how his parish is benefiting from grants received from the C.U.F.) As an "inset" to this publication there is a broadsheet giving you information about the C.U.F. and also an envelope in which you can place your donation at the end of Lent. The usual C.M.S. Lent boxes will also be readily available in church for those who either prefer to give to C.M.S. or in addition to the C.U.F. I personally have always seen the Lent Appeal as the opportunity to give something extra during this short period before Easter. Some people do without a meal one day a week; others have a smaller meal than usual. This is what we do, so that on Saturdays we always have what we can This is what we do, so that on Saturdays we always have what we call a "starvation meal". It was several years ago, whilst our children were still quite small, that they made the suggestion that we should do this not only on Saturdays in Lent, but throughout the year. As a result we have been able to give the money saved thereby to our 3 appeals each year at Lent, Harvest and Christmas. May I commend this practice to you most warmly?

The mid-week programme during Lent this year reverts to a pattern that we had several years ago. Instead of ecumenical house groups we plan to have a communion service in the Church Lounge on Tuesday evenings. In the context of this, Robin Hazelhurst and myself will give a series of addresses based upon Bible passages. For those who can't get out in the evenings, a parallel service will be held on the Wednesday morning.

As you are no doubt aware, there are families in our community living at or below the poverty level and we see evidence of this in our Church school. I am trying to set up a fund of good second-hand children's clothing which can be sold to parents at prices which they can afford and which will also serve to meet the immediate needs of children in school. Our children's sizes range from small 3 year old to large 11 year old. I would be very grateful to receive any unwanted/outgrown clothing in this range that has been cluttering up your children's wardrobes! If you ring me on 492351, I will willingly collect it. I intend this to be an ongoing project so would ask for your continued support. I'm sure we will all welcome this opportunity to help those in our community less fortunate than ourselves.

The Evangelical Alliance Relief Fund is one of two Christian Relief Agencies that we support, the other being Christian Aid. We give to Tear Fund through our annual Harvest and Christmas Appeals and occasionally when we have a retiring collection following a disaster like an earthquake, flooding or famine. In addition our Sunday School Departments sponsor two children through the Child Sponsorship programme and the Ladies Guild give support through the Meals Sponsorship programme. Last year we sent a total sum to Tear Fund of well over £1300.



Though there is no doubt that there is corruption and fraud overseas as well as in the City of London, the Christian Relief agencies do take scrupulous care in this regard. 
