

THE RECTOR WRITES...



ABOUT CHURCH MEMBERSHIP

How does one become a member of our Church?

In theological terms it is when you are baptized, though of course we do need to realize that because baptism is a sacrement it has two parts, an outward sign and an inward experience. Our membership is a merely nominal thing when the outward is not accompanied by the inward. Our membership only becomes effective when the outward and visible sign of baptism is accompanied by the inward spiritual experience of the new birth.

In <u>legal terms</u> we are recognised as members of Deane Church when we join the Church Electoral Roll and one of the conditions for joining is that we have been baptized. The Roll is an important list because it is the **register** of those who are entitled

- * vote at the annual Church meeting
 - * hold office as sidesmen and/or Church councillors
 - * be married in Deane Church if they do not possess the necessary residential qualifications.

In addition the size of the Roll is a factor used in determining how many representatives we may appoint to represent us at the Deanery Synod, and also for calculating our share of the Diocesan Budget to which we contribute through the "Diocesan Quota".

Clearly it is important that this Roll should be an accurate and realistic indication of the strength or weakness of our congregation. To ensure that it is brought up to date it is revised annually before Easter. And then, once every six years the existing Roll is scrapped and a completely new Roll is produced. This is our task in 1990.

Our Church Council is most anxious that we treat this exercise in a responsible way. There is much more to being a member of the Christian Church than the signing of an application form. To this end we have produced a "Church membership pack" which will be available later in the month. In addition to the application form for membership of the new Electoral Roll the pack will also contain material to help you to work your own responsibilities of Church membership in a practical way. I hope you will find this both challenging and helpful.

.....ABOUT LENT

By a strange coincidence the last day of the month is also the first day of Lent. Though our Lent programme falls into next month our preparation for it takes place About 50 of our members are already involved in the Home Groups which are now meeting on Tuesdays and Wednesdays at fortnightly intervals. However, for those who for one reason or another have continue throughout Lent. not joined a Home Group there will be a series of 5 Lent Bible Study Groups at weekly intervals on Tuesday evenings and on Wednesday afternoons and evenings. They will be considering St. Mark's account of the final week in the life of our Lord. As an alternative to the Bible Study Groups there is a 5 week course also on Tuesday evenings and Wednesday afternoons and evenings entitled "Living with Loss". Using some excellently produced video material me shall be considering the important This could be especially helpful for those who are subject of bereavement. experiencing bereavement now, and also for those who desire to understand and help This course is open to members of the existing Home Groups, those who are bereaved. but only if they see it as an addition and not as an alternative to their Home Group programme. Details of the Lent programme will become available during the month.
