

EDITORIAL

PEACE ON EARTH?

26th January, 1991

No sooner had we stopped singing our Christmas Carols about "Peace on Earth", than war broke out in the Middle East. It wasn't unexpected for we had had several months warning of the possibility. A great deal of prayer had been offered to God that we might be spared this possibility. I have good reason to believe that these prayers were by no means confined to practising Christians. I'm sure that devout Muslims as well as nominal believers of various religions who only resort to prayer in emergency situations will have echoed this desire for peace in their prayers. Are we to conclude that God has been deaf to our requests? Has it all been a waste of time and to no avail?


In spite of the loss of life (even relatively light casualties are costly to those involved) and the enormous and mind-boggling cost of ammunition alone (estimated at £250 million each day) it will not have been to no avail if at least these 3 things happen as a consequence:

1. The aggressor is removed from Kuwait and peace with justice can be guaranteed for the Gulf region.

2. The rest of the world has the motivation to solve the longer standing Jew/Arab conflict which guarantees Israel the security it needs, and the Palestinian Arabs

a homeland to which they are entitled.

The richer countries of the world, which includes the U.K., are prepared to devote even a fraction of what they are at present spending in this Gulf War to those countries where famine and poverty are endemic. What the Christian and humanitarian relief agencies are able to do is but a drop in the ocean compared with what the richer countries of the world can and should be doing. It really is immoral and obscene that such colossal sums are spent on arms and so relatively little on relief work.



Our Lent programme begins with a Communion Service at 8.00 pm on Ash Wednesday in the Church Lounge. It will incorporate the newly launched "Prayer Focus". This is a monthly gathering when, as a Church, we meet together for thanksgiving, praise and prayer, For those who can't manage this there will be the usual Wednesday morning service at 10.am.

In the following 5 weeks we shall be making use of some of the material prepared in connection with the Decade of Evangelism initially for the dioceses of Oxford and Southwell. Rightly or wrongly, I considered this be better for our particular use at this point in time than that prepared for our own diocese. Depending upon the numbers who'sign-on' we are hoping to have groups meeting at different times on Tuesdays and Wednesdays. The details are contained on a pink-coloured sheet which is now available. I do hope that many of you will consider making a special effort in Lent this year to join one of these groups for the 5 week period.

There will be 2 other regular happenings in Lent, and a special one this year. The special event is one of our occasional "Saturday Nights at Eight". This is a social occasion when, after an initial drink whilst people are assembling, there is a chance to meet our special guests for the evening who on this occasion are Bishop Alan and Vivienne Winstanley, who will shortly be returning to Peru and Bolivia in South America. We then have an evening meal together. There is a catering list in Church on which you can indicate what you will provide for the common Pool of food. The regular happenings include the Lent Appeal which I encourage you to support not so much by making extra donations, but by doing without a meal once a week or by having a smaller meal than usual and giving the money saved thereby. Then as Lent draws to a close we recall the institution of the service of Holy Communion by having a Fellowship Meal on Maundy Thursda Roger B.Jackson.

A Tale told in Old Jerusalem.....

The old Rabbi was revered and loved by all the people of the town, and indeed men and women came from villages and hamlets throughout the region to hear him. They listened attentively when he explained the law in the synagogue: they brought their quarrels to him for just settlements which left both sides satisfied, and mothers brought their babies to him for So the fame of this kind and godly man grew, everyone agreeing how blessed they Only one man disagreed - Aaron the tanner. were to have the good Rabbi among them.

Aaron listened as carefully as anyone to the sermons in the synagogues, but he was alert to pick up any error or inconsistency. He dismissed the blessing of babies as vulgar popularity He criticised the Rabbi's decisions and found flaws in his reasoning. seeking. of the Rabbi's admirers only provoked Aaron to look for more faults.

Then Aaron died suddenly. Most people said that it was God's judgement on him. As most of Aaron's own family had died or left home, there were few to mourn him. Only one person showed genuine grief and that was the Rabbi. "Why do you weep?" asked the Rabbi's bewildered followers. "He was your enemy, your chief critic, the one who always found fault with you". "He was my truest friend", replied the Rabbi. "He forced me to Who is there now to show me my faults?" think clearly and reason carefully.

PRAISE HIM IN THE SUPERMARKET? - by JOHN PAXTON OUR INDUSTRIAL CHAPLAIN

Why did 250 smartly dressed, well paid, young retail managers sit for 45 minutes in the rather oppressive surroundings of an Oxford College chapel one Sunday morning last August?

Certainly there was an expectation that they would be present, because they were all attending a week-long training course, but nobody was forced to be there, particularly so early in the morning. Reasons for their presence might have included curiosity, peer pressure, "going for a laugh", or a willingness to try it and see.

The service was directed entirely at people involved in the retail trade, so that the prayers, responses, address and readings all related to to the theme of the Christian attitude to the retail industry and the people affected by it. The service was designed to encourage the congregation to see that the Gospel does apply to their companies and their jobs, and that God is concerned about the world of shopping both now and in the future. The worship allowed the participants to express their fears and hopes about the significant changes taking place in their business.


Although the service was a special occasion, it tells us that all worship must relate directly to the current feelings, thoughts and experience of the worshippers, set in the wider context of God's love and his purpose for us. A sense of awe, and the almighty power of God must be balanced in our worship with the immediacy and concreteness of our daily lives.

Ron Morris takes a peep into the places of Christians in Iraq
Arab Christians in Iraq are a visible minority in what is a mostly Muslim
Society. About half a million of the 18 Million Iraqis are Christian. On the
whole, they are present in all segments of society. They have adequate access
to jobs, social status, and political office. (The current foreign minister,
Tarik Aziz, is of Christian background). With minor exceptions, Christians are
not in conflict with the state, which is officially secular. Government
restrictions on church activity are those which exist in Iraqi society
generally and are not applied in particular to church people or institutions
as such. About 60 percent of the Christian community are members of the
Chaldean Catholic Church in communion with Rome. Other Christian traditions
present in Iraq in small numbers are Eastern Orthodox (Greek), Reformed
(Evangelical), Adventist, Western-rite Roman Catholics and Oriental Orthodox
from Egypt (Copts).


<u>Alice Hough</u> has suggested that this prayer may be worth using if your New Year resolutions are faltering-
