

The Rector writes

CHILDREN IN CHURCH

30th January, 1993.

When we are preparing parents for the baptism of their children we emphasize the following points:-

- 1. In baptism their children are being admitted into full membership of the Church Family at Deane just as they entered into full membership of their human families at birth a few months earlier.
- 2. If their children are to have a healthy physical, mental and emotional development then they will need all the love and discipline, security and support that their human family can provide. Likewise if their children are to have a healthy spiritual growth then they will need all the love and encouragement that the Church family can provide.

 3. This support from both the human and Church families is to be forthcoming now; it is not something we can afford to put 'on hold' for several years until children are
- is not something we can afford to put 'on hold' for several years until children are older. For children to be deprived of this essential support in their early years is a sure way of producing delinquents. And there are spiritual delinquents as well as psychological delinquents.
- 4. If children are to be saved from the danger of spiritual delinquency then it stands to reason that their parents (or at least one of them, but preferably both) are in a meaningful sense practising members of the Church family themselves. Consequently we make no apology for encouraging parents with their children to meet with the Church family for worship on Sunday mornings. Herein lies a problem.

From a parent's point of view

However informally we at the front seek to conduct our worship and encourage people to be relaxed, the fact is that the age, the size and the atmosphere of our Church building generates a sense of awe. This is no bad thing, but it does mean that parents find it hard to be relaxed because they are conscious that their young children may be disturbing the peace. Children, of course. are very different from each other. Those who are used to a disciplined and orderly routine at home usually have less difficulty fitting into our Sunday morning worship than those children who are used to a 'free for all' at home. My advice to parents is to avoid reacting in one of two On the one hand avoid being over sensitive. Don't imagine that because your children cough, or cry you and they have broken the 11th Commandment! On the whole most adults are tolerant and sympathetic and do not think ill of you and your On the other hand avoid being insensitive to the feelings of others. Their tolerance can be stretched to breaking point if you allow your children to run riot and to be disruptive and distracting. After all what we are meant to be doing in Church is worshipping God, not providing a children's playground. In these circumstances why not avail yourself of the provision of the creche? would say persist - don't give up and stay away.

From the congregations point of view.

If what we say to parents when preparing them for the baptism of their children is to have any credence at all, then we will need to display a greater degree of understanding and tolerance. It really isn't acceptable to say in effect to parents with young children 'We love to see you, but we hate to hear you'. It is neither realistic nor reasonable to expect young children to sit still in our most uncomfortable pews for a hour or so without batting an eyelid! My advice to the rest of the congregation (and this includes myself) is this:— Firstly, let us not forget what it was like when our children were youngsters. Secondly, let us realize that as we get older we find it harder to tolerate distractions and noise levels. Thirdly, let us avoid critical words, looks and attitudes directed towards parents with younger children. Fourthly, have you considered volunteering to help with the creche? It doesn't have to be run by young parents. Experienced helpers could give young parents a welcome break.

If you have any further practical suggestions for overcoming this particular problem, I would love to hear from you.

Israel was also involved in fighting battles and although their battles were with human adversaries I believe that we can learn from their example. On one occasion while a battle was being fought out in the valley below, Moses went to the top of a hill to pray. While he prayed the Israelites won the battle but the moment he stopped praying the enemy began to win. So Aaron and Hur joined him and helped him to keep on praying until the battle was won. (You can read the story in Exodus 17.8-13)

I believe that the same will be true of our missions and that if we pray then we will see people coming to know Jesus. But I guess that many of us like

Moses might find it hard to keep on praying and so I should like to encourage you to think about ioining one of the MISSION TRIPLETS. It's not difficult to be part of a mission triplet, they are just groups of three friends who meet together regularly to pray. You don't even have to meet for very long, 15 minutes would be plenty if it was actually spent praying (although it will obviously take longer if vou want to have a drink and a chat too!).

So why don't you give it a try and get together with two of your friends to pray. It is prayer that will strengthen us for mission and it is prayer which will win the battle.


BAPTISM
