

# The Rector writes

29th January, 1994.

It was about 15 years ago that I had occasion to go to the large Calderstones Hospital near Blackburn to take a widow to see her very severely mentally handicapped son. the surroundings, on what was a lovely summer's day, were most attractive, the actual blocks in which the patients were housed were rather grim. Many of the patients had spent most of their lives in that institution. In more recent years there has been a policy of seeking to run down these institutions in favour of caring for the mentally handicapped in the community. The policy hasn't been 100% successful, and the press are never slow to highlight some of the horror stories. However, there have been some success stories too, and one of these is Gerald Bancroft who, until his very sudden death earlier this month, was a member of our small evening congregation.

Gerald had been 'incarcerated' in Calderstones for about 30 years. He was then patiently and gently 'nursed' into the wider community both by the professional care workers and the members of Church communities at Deane URC and St. Luke's Halliwell where he attended on Sunday mornings, and by Tom and Marjorie Stokes and our evening congregation. Gerald may have suffered with a handicap in his mind, but there was no such handicap in his heart. He was a most loving and affectionate person and I'm sure that the ladies will miss the goodnight kiss that he so liberally gave them at the end of the evening service! a most fitting tribute both to Gerald and to those who have helped him in recent years that St. Luke's Church was full for his funeral.





This year we shall be making use of material that has been specially commissioned by the Council of Churches for Britain and Ireland and is being used extensively throughout the Its title is "HAVE ANOTHER LOOK" It is designed to help groups which include:

\* people enquiring about Christian faith, who wish to have another look at what it means. \* people who have moved away from Christian faith or from belonging to a Church and who

are interested in thinking again.

\* people who are already Church members, and who are willing to share their faith with those enquiring, and in the process have a fresh look at it themselves.

The themes to be covered are:

What are we looking for?

- What will make us truly happy?
- \* How do we cope with suffering? \* Is there any mystery in life?
- \* Where do we want to go now?

In each group session there will be 4 stages:

- A starting point to get us talking \* Looking more deeply as the discussion moves to a deeper level
- Looking at a Bible passage to explore its relevance
- \* Prayer and reflection.

I would like to think that this programme is comprehensive enough to help most of us who attend Deane Church and who have open minds, and therefore I wish to encourage you to commit yourself to joining a midweek group on the middle 5 Tuesdays or Wednesdays in Lent. Lists are in Church for you to sign up. Don't leave it to others. This is for you unless you are one of those who think you have got it all 'buttoned up'. Roger B. Jackson.

## New English Orchestra

This orchestra of Christian instrumentalists is presenting a 'Vigil for Great Britain' at a number of cathedrals including our own Manchester Cathedral on Saturday February 5th at 7.30 pm. The programme consists of a service of music interspersed with prayers for our nation featuring Allegri's Miserere.



This is a tremendous setting of Psalm 51 David's song of repentance and calling out to God. The evening is so designed that even non-Christians should feel able to stand with us as they did after the Warrington bombings and to stand against the destructive forces at work in our land. Tickets are not required. There is no admission charge but an offering will be taken.

is the title of the new Gospel Musical by the talented Roger Jones. It will be presented at the Victoria Hall, Knowsley Street on Sunday, February 13th at 2.30 pm by the Greater Manchester United Christian Singers with the dramatic content by the drama group Mustard Seed. When the choir presented this modern new work recently at the Liverpool Philharmonic Hall and the Manchester Free Trade Hall as part of a national tour it received excellent reviews. Once again tickets are not required and though admission is free a retiring collection will be taken to defray costs.





Have you got any old pairs of glasses that you no longer need? They might enable an African pastor to read the Scriptures! It is really good to know that I have the support, both financial and prayer, of the Body of Christ at Deane. I shall be spending 5 months working with Jeremy and Jan Howat, missionaries with S.A.M.S., at their church in Roserio. They want me to try to help encourage the youth and the music there, and I'm trusting in God that the gifts and experience he has given me, along with my mustard seed of faith will be enough to produce some fruit. Its really a bit scary when I think of the reality of my going there, but I have to keep reminding myself that "God works for the good of those who those who love him", even, and especially, when we suffer.

Since October I have been working in a L'Arche community. This is an International Christian Charity which welcomes mentally handicapped people 'les personnes'. We live and work together in a community. Each individual is accepted as they are, with their strengths and weaknesses. I live in a foyer for 10 people - 6 'personnes' ' and 4 assistants. Much emphasis is placed on being attentive towards those around us, and it is often the 'personnes' who demonstrate the deepest and purest sort of love. I feel very privileged to share in how they live here.

Once again loads of thanks. Its really good to feel that I have the church behind me. I feel that this 'love gift' has been given in the spirit that led the Apostles in Acts ch 4 v.32 to share their possessions. I look forward to sharing with you some of the things God has given and will give me. I hope to see you in late February as I move from France to Argentina. Love and prayers. Jane Willford.
