The Rector writes

Contrary to the impression that some people may have our Church Council meetings are rarely dominated by financial matters. However, at our January meeting we do concentrate on money as we discuss the budget for the coming year. Our treasurer, Keith Acton, estimated that if during 1995 our ordinary income could increase by at least 5% (last year it increased by 6 1/2%) then we ought to be able to meet our ordinary expenditure. The major item of expenditure is £34,344 which is our share of the total parish contribution of £56,833 to the Diocese of Manchester. In the main these large sums are used for the training, housing and payment of our clergy. Other major items of expenditure include £6,865 which we plan to give to missions and charities and £8,200 to maintain our Church building (insurance, heat, light, cleaning and on-going repairs). By far the major source of income comes from what members give in their Christian Giving Envelopes, and this is considerably higher when their giving is "covenanted", for then the Church can claim back from the Inland Revenue what the person has already paid in tax. In practical terms when our treasurer is looking for an all round increase of at least 5% it means an extra 5p. for every £1 you already give I don't think this is at all unreasonable or impossible. Though many people claim to be short of money it really is staggering to see how easily people are able to find one pound or more for a go on the national lottery.

The more challenging part of the discussion centred around the establishing of a set of priorities for major items of extraordinary expenditure during the next 3 years or so. At the top of our list is the provision of a new heating system. The present boiler is proving to be unreliable and inefficient, and we are proposing to replace it with a new gas-fired system costing about £11,500. This will be located in the choir vestry where hopefully it will be far less vulnerable to the vandalism to which the existing boiler house has been subjected. We are proposing to pay for this out of the Church Fabric Fund to which some people are regularly contributing. We are especially grateful to two gentlemen who died last autumn and who made generous bequests. I never cease to be amazed how we receive gifts like these from people who, so are as I know, have had little or no contact with our Church over the time I have been here.

Our second order of priority is to carry out work which has been strongly recommended both by our architect, Richard Byrom, and by English Heritage who are concerned for the preservation of ancient monuments. This relates to the replacing of weathered stonework and the provision of polycarbonate protective covering to the remaining windows. This work can attract grant aid from English Heritage up to 40% of the cost, and we have applied for this help. Depending upon the outcome of this application we are hoping to be able to tackle other tasks like the replacement of the Memorial Hall windows and boiler which is also on its last legs. Some of these major items of expenditure can be paid for out of our reserves, but it has been our aim not to deplete these too much. Major Crook, who was an excellent steward of our Church's finances, always encouraged us to pay for extraordinary items from the interest generated by our reserves.

The Church Council as been given a <u>Time Share Studio Apartment</u> for 2 persons on a well-appointed complex at Benaldamena near Malaga in Spain. It is available for anyone who wishes to use it for a week or a fortnight in the period March 12-26. The Council has decided to dispose of this property later this year. Though it is valued in the region of £5,000 we are willing to consider a much lower offer in order to increase our capital reserves for the heavy expenditure in the year ahead. Stan Wilson has the details and is handling this matter. He will welcome enquiries (tel. 492034).

Over recent years the Parish Prayer Diary has been produced by a number of people who have each taken a turn. We are most grateful to one of the Tuesday evening Home groups, to Joyce Sutcliffe and most recently to Gail Cheetham who has undertaken this task each month. The Pathfinders are very pleased to announce that their Sponsored Sing for Children in Need raised the wonderful sum of £636.00. Our thanks go to Becky Rutter for organising it and also to all the members of our congregation who supported us so well.

From the beginning of this year we are going to be supporting the work of one of our former EFAC bursars whom Sheila Dewhurst-Taylor went to visit recently in Kenya. He is now Provost of Embu and also involved in working with children and older people who are destitute, homeless and, quite often, hooked on drugs. His project involves forming a community where these people can be looked after and helped to overcome their drug dependency. Sheila came to talk to the Pathfinders in November and we were all very moved by what she had to tell us. In our question time and discussion afterwards it was actually proposed by one of the Pathfinders (with no adult prompting!) that everybody pay an extra 10p per week subs after Christmas so that a regular amount of money can be sent every month to support this vital work. Since then three members of the congregation have offered to make a donation of an extra £5.00 per month each and Sheila has received donations from three other people. If anyone else would like to be identified with the Pathfinders in this effort, please have a word with Sheila; she will be delighted to hear from you.



I'm delighted that over forty people have responded to my letter requesting prayer support for our CYPECS organisations. It's so good to know that so many people are going to be praying regularly for our children and young people, as well as their leaders. My heartfelt thanks go to all those who have responded - and it isn't too late; the box for replies is still at the back of church and I check it every week for more slips! Also, there are spare letters near the box in case you didn't manage to have one thrust upon you or yours got lost! If you haven't already replied, please give it some thought; our children and young people really do need your prayers.
