The Rector writes

21st January 1998.

I have always been impressed by the way St. Paul, when encouraging the Christians at Corinth in South Greece to give financial support to his first century relief fund for the poor and needy, used as an incentive the example of other Christians in Macedonia. Of them he says that though these Christians in North Greece were having a tough time themselves they were extremely generous, and even though they were very poor they gave as much as they could and even more than they could. Moreover, they gave of their own free will.

In the last four weeks I have had four encouraging examples of giving which I wish to share with you.

- 1. A pensioner from our St. Andrews congregation on hearing that at St. Mary's we were unable to pay our full share of the diocesan budget last year, phoned me to ask if she may be permitted to help reduce the shortfall by making a donation of £650.
- 2. A former member of our congregation on learning that the East window in the Chapel was in urgent need of attention because of a design fault in its construction, has promised to donate £1,000 towards the overall cost of £1850 + vat, i.e. £2,400. If, as I hope, this person is prepared to "Gift Aid" her donation, then our treasurer will be able to claim from the Inland Revenue an additional £300. This will enable us to proceed with repairing 2 of the 3 lancets that make up the window.
- 3. A present member of our congregation who is becoming increasingly housebound through age and ill health without fail gives me £5 per month to be used at my discretion but primarily to defray the cost of the materials we use in our home group programmes. She would have liked to have been able to take part herself, but her infirmity prevents her from doing so. This is her way of identifying herself with an aspect of our Church life which she knows is very close to my heart.
- 4. Another elderly housebound member of our Church Family to whom I and my colleagues have regularly taken communion for several years asked me if she could give Charlie Moore a Home Communion set as a farewell gift. He used it for the first time when giving her Christmas Communion on New Year's Eve in what was his final service as curate of Deane.

WANTED


Crosslinks, the mission agency with whom Charlie and Sara Moore will be serving in Zimbabwe, require that they communicate a regular news and prayer letter to their Christian friends and link parishes 3 times per year. They require someone in this country, preferably from their home parish here in Deane, to act as the co-ordinator. This person will need to be someone who can be relied upon to photocopy the master copy as soon as they receive it and dispatch it as quickly as possible to those on the address list which needs to be kept up to date. This will involve a cost both in time and money and it could be seen as that persons contribution to the practical support that Charlie and Sara need. If this is a way in which you can be of service to God please have a chat with me to discuss what is involved.

Lent Home Groups

At a recent meeting of home group leaders it was agreed unanimously to make use this year of an "Emmaus" course entitled "Growing in the Scriptures". The 5 week course aims to give us an overview of the Bible. It was felt that though many of us are familiar with certain parts of the Bible we are often ignorant of other parts, especially the Old Testament. The course assumes that most of us don't know a great deal about the Scriptures and therefore we need to learn some basic things in order to see the Bible as a whole. It should therefore, be helpful to beginners, and for those of us who regard ourselves as having passed through this stage we can be of assistance in helping one another to catch up on this part of the Spiritual Journey. It will be a great help to the administration if you "sign on" for the Lent course using the list in Church this month.



WORLDINEWS

EUROPEAN UNION

The Presidency of the European Union (EU) revolves between member countries and January sees the beginning of Britain's six month term. Under Britain's Presidency the EU will decide its position on the re-negotiation of the Lomê Agreement – the agreement that gives aid and preferential trade arrangements to poorer former colonies. Pray for the British Government as it takes up the Presidency, asking that EU policies will have a positive impact on the Third World.

ENVIRONMENT

Following last month's summit in Kyoto, Japan, on lobal warming, pray that world leaders will have the political will to take seriously humanity's responsibility

as stewards of God's creation. At the summit British scientists said that more than 20 million people will face starvation and drought in the next 50 years as a result of climate change.

ANDMINES

Give thanks to God for the deal banning landmines signed by 110 countries last month in Ottawa, Canada. Pray that key countries refusing to sign, including the USA, Russia, China and India, would bow to international pressure. The UK has said it will make the provision of aid conditional on countries signing up to the landmine ban.

AERICA

RWANDA

Recent raids by Hutu militiamen on a Rwandan jail have resulted in the release of over 700 prisoners facing trial for genocide. An estimated 15,000 Hutu militiamen, albeit poorly armed, are waging a campaign of violence in the north-west of the country. Pray for stability in Rwanda and for Tearfund-supported reconciliation. Pray too for the judicial process – 120,000 people are awaiting trial for genocide in poor conditions in makeshift jails.

SOMALIA

The Shabelle and Juba rivers have burst their banks resulting in the worst flooding in Somalia for 40 years. The death toll has risen to over 1,500 and around

220,000 people have been made homeless. Pray for Tearfund partner World Concern, assisting those affected.

CONGO

Clashes between army factions recently saw some of the worst violence since the take-over by President Laurent Kabila. Pray for renewed peace and stability. Pray, too, that President Kabila will rule with justice and integrity. There is concern over the new government's obstruction of a United Nations mission investigating massacres of Rwandan refugees.

ΔSIA

INDIA

Sixty people were killed last month by an armed gang in an outbreak of caste violence in the eastern state of Bihar. The dead were supporters of the Indian Communist Party and are thought to have been killed by Ranbir Sena, a private militia hired by landowners. Pray for peace in the region and inclusion within society of the marginalised.

VIETNAM

Five hundred people have died and over 3,600 are missing as a result of Typhoon Linda. Thousands have been left homeless in the worst storm in Vietnam since

1904. Pray for the victims and that aid will reach those who need it.

NORTH KOREA

Peace talks started last month in Geneva between North Korea, South Korea, the United States and China in Geneva to replace the armistice that followed three years of fighting in the Korean Peninsula. Pray that the talks will end in a long-term peace agreement. Pray for Tearfund partners bringing relief in North Korea – it is the first time Tearfund has been able to work in the communist North.
