

As we draw close to the end of this millennium we can react to it in at least four different ways.

- 1. Some of us are approaching it with <u>fear</u> afraid of the so called "millennium bug" which we are told could lead to a wholesale breakdown of all those many aspects of modern life which depend upon computers for their smooth working. For instance, our Church insurers have warned us to make sure that our heating system and intruder alarm are compliant. We have been assured by their installers that they are!
- 2. The opposite reaction has been to welcome the occasion with <u>enthusiasm</u> as a potential money-spinner for those with vested interests in the catering and entertainment industries. However, the grossly exaggerated fees and wages that are being demanded for working on New Year's Eve and New Year's Day have meant that a good number of the prestigious celebration parties have had to be cancelled for people have not been willing to pay the prices being asked. A number of the enthusiastic entrepreneurs have got their fingers burnt!
- 3. We can be <u>apathetic</u> as a result of all the "hype" or exaggerated publicity and media promotion. After all one day is no different from any other in the calendar. I have to confess that this has been my first reaction until I was challenged to view the occasion in a more positive light and that is.....
- 4.for Christians and the Christian Church to view the Millennium as a great opportunity to spell out what it is all about. We are celebrating the 2000th anniversary of Almighty God entering our world in the person of Jesus of Nazareth. How are we to do this?

<u>Firstly</u>, in common with many other Churches both locally and nationally we have been displaying on our Church notice board for several months the millennium sign. Interesting enough the first time I saw what was the forerunner of this sign was at Ephesus in Turkey in March 1998. The Christian Church in that country in incredibly small but they were witnessing boldly.

Secondly, we are planning to give a beautifully produced Millennium Gospel to each child in our Church day school and Church organisations. A printer who is a Christian man is generously making millions of these Gospels available at cost price as part of his personal giving to God's work. We are paying for them out of the money given in memory of Joyce Sutcliffe whom we have no doubt would approve of making God's Word more readily available in this way.

Thirdly, we are adapting a suggestion which has come from the Churches Together in England of encouraging one another to light a millennium candle on New Year's Eve at the turn of the millennium. These candles are in plastic containers and are accompanied by a card containing the Millennium Resolution "Let there be respect for the earth, peace for its people, love in our lives, delight in the good, forgiveness for past wrongs and from now on a new start". It had been hoped that every household in the country would receive one of these packs but the cost of doing this would be prohibitive. However, we have purchased a good number of candles, each pack costing 30p. It is our hope that members of the congregation will take those for themselves and to hand to neighbours and friends. On no account are they to be sold, but if people taking them would like to make a contribution towards their cost that will be very much appreciated.


Mary joins me in sending you our best wishes for Christmas and the Millennium celebrations.

Walk Thru the Old Testament.

Paul Ellis is organising a seminar on Friday evening January 28th and Saturday morning January 29th at St. Andrews. In the space of six hours we experience the whole story of the Old Testament from the creation in Genesis all the way through the major people, places and events to Malachi. In a very memorable way we see the captivity, the exile, and the returns from exile all graphically explained by transforming the room where we meet into a map of the Middle East, The seemingly impossible is achieved, namely an understanding of how the whole of the Old Testament fits together and taught in a refreshingly different way. Pray for Tearfund partner Daystar University in Nairobi following two bomb threats from a caller claiming to represent "The Worshippers of Allah". The first was dismissed as a hoax, but the second threat was immediately relayed to the Athi River campus. Swift action was taken to evacuate students from classrooms and call in security personnel, who arrived promptly.

SUDAN

Members of Tearfund partner the Episcopal Church of Sudan (ECS) have responded with prayer and fasting to the latest government move to seize their church and land. The Khartoum authorities have tried several times in the past two years to confiscate the land.

SIERRA LEONE

Sierra Leone is emerging from nine years of savage civil war after a cease-fire agreement was signed in May. Pray for the former rebel leaders as they join the government and persuade their fighters to disarm. Pray for reconciliation at all levels throughout the country, for peace to hold, and for the many, both fighters and civilians, coming to terms with trauma, physical injury, and loss of family members and livelihoods. As the disarmament process begins, access will increase for humanitarian agencies to reach up to two million people with much needed food and medical care.

EUROPE/MIDDIE EAST

GREECE

Pray for the Pentecostal Church in Thessaloniki and its pastor, John Demetriades, who has to stand trial charged with operating an illegal church, despite the fact that since December 1938 the church has had a licence from the government to operate. All evangelical

churches in the whole country open and operate with the permission of the Religion Department of Greece. There now appears to be renewed persecution from the Orthodox Church.

ATIN AMERICA



Pray for peace talks between government and rebels, that they will lead to greater understanding and genuine and lasting peace.

🔘 CENTRAL AMERICA

Remember those affected by the devastation caused by floods and mudslides last month, in an area still recovering from the impact of Hurricane Mitch.

AFGHANISTAN

The coming winter will cause severe hardship for over 100,000 refugees as many homes have been destroyed by the Taliban. Pray for adequate food and shelter. Remember too refugees in countries such as Kosovo who face a similar situation.



Pray for the whole country and its leadership following President Habibe's resignation. Pray for good governance by his successor and for lasting peace in East Timor.



INDIA Church leaders fear a new wave of violence against Christians following an attack by Hindu fundamentalists. The attack occurred the day after the election victory of the Hindu national Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) and its coalition, seriously injuring two pastors. The Pope is scheduled to visit India next month, and Hindu leaders are demanding that Pope John Paul II offer an unconditional apology for atrocities committed by missionaries, something the Vatican will almost certainly refuse. This could create a very tense situation.



Orissa Disaster Appeal
